School staff that are responsible for leading recess in schools can use the <u>Strategies for Recess in Schools</u>, <u>Recess</u> <u>Planning in Schools: A Guide to Putting Strategies for Recess into Practice</u>, and customizable <u>Recess Planning</u> <u>Template</u> to help them identify what is currently happening or not happening with recess in their school. School staff can then use this information to develop a written recess plan that serves all students. FAQs About the Resources for Recess

Below are FAQs about the resources for recess that can be used to frame social media posts or write a short article in a newsletter or blog.

What is it?

CDC and SHAPE America developed <u>Strategies for Recess in Schools</u> to provide schools with 19 evidencebased strategies for recess, and <u>Recess Planning in Schools: A Guide to Putting Strategies for Recess into</u> <u>Practice</u> and <u>Recess Planning Template</u> to help schools develop a written recess plan that integrates the evidence-based strategies.

What's the purpose?

The purpose of resources for recess is to help schools develop a written recess plan and implement strategies for recess to increase students' physical activity and improve their academic achievement.

What resources have been developed?

- <u>Strategies for Recess in Schools</u>—Describes 19 evidence-based strategies for planning and providing recess in schools.
- <u>Recess Planning in Schools: A Guide to Putting Strategies for Recess into Practice</u>—Provides a guide to help schools develop a written recess plan.
- <u>Recess Planning Template</u>—Provides a customizable template for schools to use to document the strategies they will use in their school recess plan.
- <u>SHAPE America Recess Web site</u>—Identifies additional resources that schools can use to help them address the evidence-based strategies.

Who's the target audience?

• The primary audience for these new resources for recess is school staff or school groups that provide guidance on recess.

How can schools or school groups use these resources?

- Use <u>Strategies for Recess in Schools</u> to identify the 19 evidence-based strategies for planning and providing recess in schools.
- Use <u>Recess Planning in Schools: A Guide to Putting Strategies for Recess into Practice</u> to help schools develop a written recess plan.
- Use the customizable <u>Recess Planning Template</u> to help schools develop their own school recess plan and make it their own.
- Use <u>SHAPE America Recess Web site</u> for recess to download additional resources that can help schools address the evidence-based strategies for recess.

How can states or districts use these resources?

- Collaborate with state and/or district chapters/organizations (e.g., <u>SHAPE America</u>, <u>AHG</u>, <u>AFHK</u>) to determine how to
 - Train groups that work with school staff on how to use these resources.
 - Share the new resources for recess directly with schools.
- Engage school staff, parents, and other community members as a way to build support for recess in schools.
- Use the new resources for recess to provide technical assistance on recess to districts and/or schools.
- Use for personal professional development.

What can you do?

- Share the new resources for recess with your partners and constituents through email and social media (refer to promotion kit).
- Provide trainings to district and school staff on these new resources for recess in schools.
- Share the importance of recess at PTO/PTA or school wellness meetings.

Who developed these resources?

The <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u> and <u>SHAPE America</u> along with the input from recess experts, researchers, and practitioners.


