Farid Howard serves as an AmeriCorps member in the Public Health AmeriCorps program with the LA County Department of Public Health. Farid chose to serve a second one-year term with Public Health AmeriCorps while working toward his undergraduate degree in health communications. "From my perspective as a Black man, I wasn't necessarily raised to trust in government institutions, public health institutions...I wasn't expecting Public Health AmeriCorps to have that ability to bring me back into the fold. That's something that I've really resonated with, and recognized the power of public service and public good. I know there are a lot of different communities that feel neglected, feel left out, and feel like maybe that this country is not for them, like what's going on, it just wasn't made with them in mind. I just really see public health as something that can bring folks into the fold. If it's not to change the entire country, at the very least, to change their communities' health outcomes and make a real impact."

Jasmine Washington served as an AmeriCorps member with Virginia Recovery Corps. At the end of her service year, she was hired by her host site, Real Life, where she now works as a peer and database administrator.

"I chose to serve with Public Health AmeriCorps and Recovery Corps because I wanted to

My service site is Real Life, and I'm a recovery navigator...I'm motivated by compassion to lend a helping hand and a listening ear and continuing to be a beacon of light to show individuals that they, too, can recover if they're willing to do the work.
